New transport exhibition opens at Museum of Liverpool

or the first time in 20 years. highlights from National Museums Liverpool's vehicle collection will go on display at the Museum of Liverpool, Liverpool on Wheels: from horses to horsepower (February 14 -November 1) will offer a unique insight into the fabulous array of vehicles built in and around the city.

Visitors to this fascinating exhibition can expect to see bicycles. carts and cars. From a Rushton Velocipede (1870) to a Range Rover Evoque (2012), each object is used as a gateway to tell the story of Liverpool's impressive transport history. Tour de Yorkshire locations announced

The eight host locations for the pro major international cycle race held in Yorkshire annually have been announced by organisers Welcome to Yorkshire and the Amaury Sport Organisation.

The stages will take place between Thursday April 30 and Sunday May 3 and will either start or finish in:

- · Barnsley: The third time in succession the town has been chosen.
- · Beverley: Both the 2016 and 2018 editions started here.
- · Halifax: The start location for the final stage of the last two editions.
- · Huddersfield: The first time the Tour de Yorkshire has visited, although the Tour de France did pass through in 2014.
- · Leeds: Three of the last five editions have concluded in the city.
- · Leyburn: Making its debut as a host location, although the riders received
